Hi to all churchyard strimming enthusiasts, past, present and future. Here is my annual call for assistance.

As most of you already know, part of the churchyard grass is left uncut during the year as a nature conservation area and the grass is only cut once in the autumn.

Last year spreading the strimming work over a longer two week period with smaller groups worked well, so the plan is to do the same again this year with two Friday/Saturday sessions the first on 13th & 14th September and the second on 20th & 21st September.

I will arrange for Anthony Hare's trailer to be there for the second session for loading up. Previous week's strimmings will be piled near the Barden Road gate to load the following week.

The grass is very thick this year but lately its has been dry and easier to cut so I've had a go already and may add another earlier strimming date in nearer the time to get ahead of the game, if that suits some of you.

We have 2 church strimming machines and PPE but if you have any useful additional tools of your own which you can bring (strimmer, rakes, shears, barrows, gloves, loppers, secateurs) that would be useful.

Refreshments will be provided.

If you are able to help for a few hours, please confirm your availability by phone or e mail which will then help me to put a rota together (see contact details below).

Your efforts in past years have been very much appreciated and make a big difference to our churchyard tidiness also helping to reduce maintenance costs, so I look forward to seeing you there for as much time as you can offer.

UPDATE ON CHAPEL PROJECT Community Share Offer

THANK YOU, THANK YOU to all of you who have chosen to support the Community Share Offer. Both existing and new members of the Community Benefit Society have made a magnificent effort on behalf of this worthy cause by raising just short of £150k.

Since then much has been done behind the scenes to fulfil the requirements to enable the purchase of the Chapel by the Speldhurst Parish Council.

We are also very grateful to the Elba Foundation who have now paid to the Community Benefit Society their pledged funding of £228k, which leaves us just shy of our preferred total of £400,000.

The Community Share Offer is still open should you wish to participate, it is not too late. It was necessary to set a deadline of July to establish speedily whether or not this project could succeed, and as has been proved the Shop and Post Office is very much still needed, so come and join You will be welcome.

Our partners, Speldhurst Parish Council are progressing towards the purchase of the Chapel.

Builders are currently putting together quotes, an application for planning permission is in and we're hopeful to have this project actually under way shortly.

We have an in-principle agreement to an extension to the lease at the current premises until December 2025 so if all falls into place, we should be able to plan for a smooth and brief transition when we relocate to the Chapel in 2025.

Now to you, the people of the village. Our team has worked tirelessly to get us this far. Whilst some of the formalities are now in the hands of others, we would like to ask:

Can you help?

We are looking for extra pairs of hands to be available to help with all manner of tasks. We are not asking for huge amounts of your time, but if you are willing to assist we need you.

For example

Communications: This can be anything from posting info through doors, to putting entries on Facebook or Instagram.

For those who don't use social media, we need a monthly post in the Speldhurst News and a few notices posted in various spots throughout the village just to keep people informed.

Gardening: You may have noticed that the Chapel grounds have been given a hair-cut recently. We need people who are happy to put in a little time to help keep the gardens tidy until we break ground, to do a bit of clearing as and when the weather permits.

Research: There will come a time when some research will be required, for all manner of things. If you don't mind trawling the internet or making some phone calls on behalf of this project, you may be the person we want.

Fundraising: As already mentioned, our preferred total for fund raising is £400,000. This will enable us to comfortably achieve our goal of delivering the project with bells and whistles. If you do not wish to become a member, but wish to raise funds to assist this project, do tell us your ideas. Every penny counts, as shown by the Drama group for Speldhurst School, who put on a production of Oliver and all tickets receipts were donated to this project.

Clearance: We need volunteers to help remove some of the unwanted items from the chapel and either take them to a charity shop, sell them or take them to the council tip. There may also be other instances when we would like to call upon those with appropriate vehicles to help with moving items for this project.

If you would like to be involved, even if you are not quite sure how yet, please give your name and email address or phone number to the Village Shop, stating Volunteer Help. Someone from the Committee will then be in contact. Don't forget, you are not signing up for anything more than you may wish, but we would be extremely grateful for your enthusiasm and assistance.

We are also always looking for volunteers to come onto the Build Committee as well. If this is of interest, again do let us know by popping into the shop with your name, email or telephone number.

Nature Watch

Now is the time that birds are starting to think of migration back to their winter quarters. Due to climate change some that migrate are tending to overwinter, it is a changing world. The first birds to go are swifts after breeding. There has been a much larger number of records of swifts at Bough Beech nature reserve this summer. It looks as if the weather has caused a big drop in insect numbers making them return to feed over the reservoir. Standing on the causeway when it's quiet the swifts would fly over the road at head height and quite close.

In the village we have a shortage of House Martins this year. There are normally two nests close to me but none this year. There have also been few swallows. I am sure that this is due to the weather being wet and cold when they arrived which made them go elsewhere. It's not only birds that move this time of the year, but the foxes are also entering a dispersal period. After young foxes get to an age where they can look after themselves, they are kicked out by Mum and Dad to find their own territories before the breeding season next year. Dispersal helps them make sure they can find enough food in the winter, stops inbreeding and helps to find a mate. This is when several young foxes get run over. If they survive their first winter, they have a good chance of a long life.

The Butterfly of the year for me so far is the Gatekeeper with up to 10 seen together in the garden. They have 2 white dots in the black spot on the wings that makes the difference between them and Meadow Browns and are often seen around field gateways hence the name.

They finished the course in under 40 minutes and raised over £400 for Cancer Research. 👌 ADVICE ABOUT BONFIRES 👏

Residents have asked what can be done about neighbours who light bonfires on fine weather days during daylight hours. If you are bothered by a bonfire at a neighbour's property, you can ask Tunbridge Wells Borough Council for advice by emailing <u>ehadmin@midkent.gov.uk</u>

Before you do so, bear in mind that the GOV.UK website says local councils can only act against a resident lighting bonfires if they believe the smoke counts as a statutory nuisance that "unreasonably and substantially interferes with the use or enjoyment of a home or other premises or injures/ is likely to injure health."

We also encourage residents to follow this guidance from TWBC: "If you are bothered by a bonfire...approach your neighbour and explain the problem...they may not be aware of the distress they are causing...if you find it difficult to approach your neighbour you may get advice from West Kent Mediation Service, who can help resolve neighbour disputes. If this fails, please contact us."

It's inspiring to see the elite athletes pushing themselves to the limit both physically and mentally to aim for Gold. Closer to home we have our own sporting 'heroes' – four intrepid dads – Damien, Doug, Owen and Ed - who embarked on a gruelling 100km walking challenge across the South Downs to raise money to support Speldhurst School's counselling and wellbeing programme. On Friday June 21st, the fathers of reception children in Pippin Class, set off



from Arundel at 4.30pm. It was a sunny afternoon, but the good weather wasn't to last as they trekked overnight through very wet, cold and windy conditions to complete the first leg of the journey, reaching the 50 km mark in the Plumpton area by breakfast time. Then with blisters patched and warm again, they continued the second half of the walk. Sadly, Doug had to

drop out at the 62km mark after succumbing to a knee injury picked up in training. The other three arrived at the finish line in Eastbourne on Saturday night, having been on the move for 27 hours 30 minutes and walking 120,000 steps each. The team said of the experience "We've been completely overwhelmed by the support we've received from the village and entire



school community. The wellbeing and counselling programme is a vital service, we're just pleased we have been able to do our bit to continue to fund it for our children."

Meanwhile back in the classroom Year 3



"IT'S BETTER TO EAT KEBABS WITH FRIENDS THAN SALAD ON YOUR OWN"

The American TV show, "Friends" ran for 10 seasons. If you missed it, you could spend the small matter of 5,191 minutes of your life catching up with the whole series. This immensely popular sitcom is so well loved for several reasons [despite finishing in 2004, it was still the favourite TV programme for young people in the UK in 2019], but at the heart of it is the sheer power and dynamism of friendship.

In the words of Christian poet Phil Knox:

We've got computers for a fiver, Cars without a driver. We've got louder, faster, further, more, A bigger network than ever before, But we need friends.

Friendship is one of the best things ever created. It is a building block of society. It helps prevent conflict and riots and [as we've seen recently in our own country] it brings people together to help clear up the mess created by violence. Friendship has a huge impact on our mental health, wellbeing and happiness but many of us feel lonely or suffocated by the pressure of life. In John's Gospel Jesus referred to his followers as *"friends"*. He said, *"You are my friends if you do what I command*. I no longer call you

servants because a servant does not know his master's business. Instead, I have called you friends.... This is my command that you love one another."

Friendship is not about the number of contacts you have on social media. It is a celebration of how profoundly good it is to know and be known and a reminder that in the age where we are only a few clicks away from anyone else on the planet, that the pursuit of deep, close relationships with a circle of friends really matters.

We ache to connect and be connected but close friendship does not just happen by accident: it takes a conscious effort. Here at St. Mary's, we aim to push back against the relentless spread of individualism and isolation and build a village community built on relationships. At our Sunday services and throughout the week in our network of Home Groups we invite people to be welcomed into life-enhancing friendships.

To Read, not to Read or to Dig

There must be as many motivations for gardening, growing your own fruit and vegetables or any activity in our gardens and allotments as there are gardening books – which means thousands.

There may be some common motivations i.e. creating an open leisure space, ecoprinciples, organic grow-your-own ambitions – though being self-sufficient and living the "Good Life" is hardly attainable with anything less than a small-holding.

And it seems that for just about every motivation, there is a source of information with packed with advice and with detailed information on technique.

The trouble is that just about every book, magazine, radio and / or tv programme provide us with huge amounts of information advising us what we need to do in our garden – why, when, where how ... to the point that it can become an overload and overbearing.

If we pay too much attention to the experts, we'll never stop, and gardening will no longer be "fun". One of the first things we often do – and we see recommended in books – when taking on a plot is to dig it.

A good dig over can be a good idea as it breaks up the soil and allows the removal of roots from perennial weds. However once completed, just watch the weeds grow back again.

Having been an allotment holder for some years, I have seen a lot of holders come and go. Perhaps the problem is that we tend to create a lot of work for ourselves, and this can become overwhelming.

So not only can the initial dig be back-breaking effort, but it is followed by the need to constantly weed. Leaving the plot for a while will result in a mini jungle that can be just as hard to clear as it was in the first place. And the weeds will compete with the vegetables that have been planted.

So, as well as potential positive outcomes, digging also has its problems.


