Tunbridge Wells Lifeboat Fundraising Branch

The RNLI have reviewed how best to focus their fundraising efforts and 'make the best of their resources'. Their efforts will be concentrated on more profitable locations closer to the coast. This has resulted in smaller branches such as ours no longer having access to the usual range of souvenirs and gifts that we sell. We would now be restricted to 10 (unsuitable) items instead of our usual selection of over 40 items! We are, of course very disappointed by this decision. In light of this, we have taken a hard look at the future of our branch.

We have an aging committee and a diminishing active supporter base, restricting our ability to undertake street collections. Since COVID we have seen far fewer opportunities for collections at supermarkets etc and pitch fees for venues have risen significantly, which impacts our profits.

Alongside a number of other small branches, we have come to the very sad decision that we will no longer continue as an official RNLI branch. We will, however continue to have our stall at Rusthall Community Coffee Mornings (last Saturday of every month at The URC Church hall, 9am- noon) where we will continue to sell our orange and lemon marmalade, small toys, donated items and seasonal plants. All money taken at these stalls will be privately donated to RNLI and gift-aided and this info will be displayed on the stall.

We are enormously grateful to all Speldhurst residents and friends who have supported us over the years, by donating in our collecting boxes and supporting our stall at the village fete and our annual coffee morning. Thank you all.

SPELDHURST CEP SCHOOL NEWS

As I write this, sunshine is pouring through my window and the birds are singing outside. Spring is well and truly on its way. By the time this article is published, parents and many in the village will already know the wonderful news that **Speldhurst School has achieved 'Outstanding' in its recent Ofsted inspection.** All five areas were judged 'Outstanding' by the inspectors – *Quality of education, *Behaviour and attitudes, *Personal development, *Leadership and management and *Early years provision.

There is a galaxy of wonderful comments in the report as well. "Pupils love coming to this friendly and welcoming school', the report says, describing the School as a 'safe and nurturing environment' where pupils are 'hungry to learn' and 'aspire to be the best they can be' and 'where hard work and achievement are celebrated'.

Head Stephanie Hayward says: "I'm thrilled and proud. It is a testament to the hard work and commitment of the staff, pupils and the entire school community"

The Ofsted inspectors also reported on the importance given to pupils' emotional and physical well-being, commenting on 'additional enrichment opportunities provided before, during and after school', featuring the popularity of the 'climbing wall' and of kick-boxing club - particularly amongst the girls

As I have written previously, the **Forest School** programme is also a popular addition to the curriculum, offering a unique opportunity for children to experience learning in the outdoor environment - from team activities such as building a shelter to learning skills including wood whittling and cooking over a fire. It may not be Bear Grylls survival exactly but it increases confidence and raises self-esteem whilst giving pupils experience, appreciation and understanding of nature and the outdoors.

This term has seen the much-needed addition of a new Forest School shelter which will offer space for even more exciting activities and outside learning whatever the weather. Fully funded by a BUPA grant, the shelter was erected by our school caretaker, the wonderful Martin Steibelt and his team of trusty volunteers, who gave their time, skills and sheer hard graft to build the shelter. (see photo below). A very big thank you to Martin and all those who helped. Speldhurst School has a longstanding debt of gratitude to all those who have volunteered in School over the years and continue to help out in so many different ways, enriching pupils' learning and experience. There are those who organise and coach sport, others who listen to children reading and regular visitors like Min Flemmington and her beautiful



black labrador Gus who volunteer through the Pets4 Therapy charity.

As the Ofsted inspectors commented in their report, *'sport has a high profile'* at Speldhurst and this term Years 3, 4 and 5 girls were treated to expert coaching by Francis Booth and Tom Churton from Speldhurst cricket club. The hope is that these fun and exciting sessions will encourage more girls to take up the sport. Meanwhile Year 4 pupils in Empire class were invited to take part in a schools' **Recorder Festival**, organised by local music teachers at Tunbridge Wells Girls' Grammar School. The children had prepared six pieces and their fabulous playing showed the musicality of the recorder which is sometimes overlooked. The instrument has even featured in the finals of the BBC Young Musician of the Year but for our young recorder players, it is an instrument which is very much at the beginning of their musical journey. As the Ofsted inspectors also said in their report: "*Drama and music, including an impressive orchestra with a repertoire that includes Rossini and Coldplay, promote character and nurture pupils' talents.*' But despite this month's fantastic news, I couldn't leave you without sharing some photos from **World Book Day** where the children excelled themselves with their creativity and costume designs with the likes of Harry Potter, Alice in Wonderland, Gangsta Granny and Captain Underpants, to name but a few. The whole day was filled with books, books and more books. Pupils swapped their favourite books with friends and immersed themselves in fun activities including 'stop, drop and read sessions'.

And as for the staff, they dressed up too – with the highlight of the day being their performance of a well-known children's book. This year, it was Mr Wolf's Pancake! I hope it had a happy ending – and the Wolf has given up gobbling children – at least for Lent!!

To our patients in Speldhurst and neighbouring villages,

As you've probably seen on the news, pharmacies are facing tough times and we are no exception.

Last year, pharmacies were closing at an alarming rate – a total of 436 community pharmacies closed permanently in the UK, and there were 13,863 temporary closures, which stopped patients from obtaining health advice and medication. The Department of Health and Social Care and NHS have announced £645,000,000 of funding for pharmacies. However, none of these funds are available to rural practices who run a dispensing service. Also, recent analysis by the Dispensing Doctor's Association suggests GP services will now be over \pm 30,000 worse off each year.

We dispense to just under 2000 local patients who live 1.6km or more away from a local community pharmacy. This number has been declining over the last few years, due to many reasons, but mainly there are so many home delivery options which can be more convenient for some.

We can be flexible and would love to hear from any patients who would consider coming back to us so we might understand how we can make it easier for you to get your prescriptions from us.

The Dispensary's income is through processing patient prescriptions, every prescription counts no matter if it's a one off antibiotic or your repeat prescription.

What are the benefits of having a dispensary right on your doorstep? The benefits include: trained, friendly staff to offer on-hand advice to help with enquiries; being able to go straight upstairs to collect your prescription after seeing your GP; being able to collect items on foot without travelling to the town centre.

So what can you do to keep our dispensary open? We need you to use us to supply your medications that you need.

To lose the dispensary would be a great loss to the community, as many of our elderly patients are within walking distance. We are dedicated and committed to providing the best possible service to our patients, hopefully for many years to come.

Speldhurst Chapel update

It's been a busy few weeks at the Chapel. We've finalised our technical drawings and layouts so that we can get the final costings in. Our structural engineers have been essential in ensuring a small layout change will make our new retail space more versatile. We can't wait to share our new space with you! We're hoping to open the new shop in November this year. But watch this space!

We've appointed Gavin Riley as our builder for the project. Gavin lives in the village and is very community minded. He's keen to get started as soon as possible.

The first stage of the build will be to clear the inside of the chapel. By the time you read this, that should hopefully be well underway. We'll then be knocking through from the existing kitchen to open up the space for our new stock room. Foundations for the extension will start when the weather has warmed up a bit.

We have also appointed a building control consultant. It's really important that we make sure the building is fit for purpose and efficient for many years to come. We're drastically improving the eco credentials of the building with lots of insultation and an upgrade to the windows, heating/cooling systems and lighting.

We've also set up an Instagram and Facebook page where you can follow our progress! Just search "Speldhurst Chapel" and you should be able to find us. A big thank you to Em Foster who will be leading on our social media for the build and for the shop going forward.

Deb Cambridge and the shop staff have been busy working out the best layout for the inside of the shop. We're keen to hear from you if there is anything you would like to see in the new Shop, or how we can improve our current offering. There is a suggestions box in the shop for anyone who would like to see something new or different in the shop.

Speldhurst Charity Celebrates its 50th Year!

In 1975 a young couple with a son diagnosed with muscular dystrophy failed to find a suitable venue which would accept a guest with disabilities. Even the holiday venues who would

accept families with a disabled member did not have the facilities needed to provide a safe and comfortable holiday.

The couple knew that looking after a family member with disabilities also left their carers in need of a period of respite and therefore set out to provide holidays where children with disabilities could have fun and their parents had time to recuperate.

So in that year a small band of volunteers which included parents of children with disabilities, raised funds to be able to take a group of children with disabilities away. That first holiday was a huge success and inspired them to carry on and start The 3H Foundation charity.

The charity quickly grew and in 1977 over 200 guests both young and old went away on a supported holiday after £5000 had been raised through fetes, raffles and 'knit-ins'!

In 1980 the charity opened one of the first charity shops in Tunbridge Wells, one that many locals still remember to this day. Enid Brown, one of the charities dedicated supporters, managed the shop and through her hard work and leadership of wonderful helpers, she made it a financial success earning her an MBE.

Many enjoyable holidays have taken place in the last 50 years. The charity has grown and developed to include support programmes for carers. The charity now offers low income families with a disabled member a UK holiday, carers to have a period of respite, adults with a disability to have an independent holiday away from their care routine and activities for young people with disabilities and young carers aged 13 - 25.

This year is our 50th Anniversary and we look forward to supporting more people with disabilities and carers for years to come!

Garden & Allotment News



April – A Risky Month for Weather

After what can often be the dismal months of November to February, March lulls us into a false sense of security with some sunny, warm days (by comparison with the months gone). Then we move into April (the year is just zooming by). At this time of year we are in a transition period between the winter months, and the warmer spring and summer.

The harbinger of better weather to come can get us enthused again about sowing, transplanting and planting our vegetables for the year to come. Some plants like as long a growing season as possible, so there is every incentive to get started. According to the RHS, April is a month of expectation for gardeners who become excited by the prospect of new growth and opportunity. However, a wise gardener will know that for all its promise, April can also deliver the occasional shock of challenging conditions.

These conditions have provided lessons painfully learnt during years past when there has been damage to relatively tender plants. Any tops of potatoes poking their heads above ground will be 'burnt' by a frost as well as onions being susceptible to heavy freezes i.e. temperatures below -2°C. In the UK, the last frost date differs significantly by region and varies from year to year. Estimated dates range from early March to the end of June, with the majority falling between mid-March and late April.

Yet during April, there is an average of just over four days when temperatures can fall to 0°C or below. In contrast, the hours of daylight increase dramatically during the month, beginning with around 13 hours of daylight and ends approaching 15 hours. Sunshine hours see a dramatic increase during April, with the UK on average seeing almost a 50% increase in sunshine hours when compared with an average March, helping to warm soils.

So there are a lot of risks in April and it pays to be careful and not to plant out too soon.

Nature Watch

We have had a much colder winter this year. The Blackthorn is much later coming into flower. This is always the first of the native trees and scrubs to flower. In mild winters they start to bloom in late January but this year its been the first week in March, so we cannot rely on climate change to give us warm winters just yet.





The Government has approved the release of Beavers into the English countryside. It is hoped this will help to cut down on flooding risks and restoring nature. A licensing system has been introduced to allow the reintroduction of the semi-aquatic animals, whose dams, canals, and ponds enhance wildlife and offer protection against floods and

droughts.

As the ivy berries ripen they have been eaten by Wood Pigeons, Squirrels, mice etc. They are an important food source at this time of the year as well being a home for hibernating Butterflies, Beetles, many types of Flies and Moths and it does not kill trees, just uses them for support.

There is a chance to see our first damselfly of the year, the Large Red, in April, around farmland and garden ponds, with the larger Dragonflies appearing in May.





At least 2 more species of Butterfly should be found in April. The Holly Blue is seen flying along hedgerows in gardens and woodland edges. These early ones will lay eggs on Holly and the 2nd batch in the late summer will lay their eggs on Ivy. The second species is the Orange Tip. The females are white on the top of the wing and the males have the top

half orange and the under sides are a mottled green. These lay their eggs mostly on Garlic Mustard plants and Milk maids /Cuckoo Flower.

LOW-FLYING JUMBO JETS IN OUR PARISH

We recently wrote to National Air Traffic Services (NATS) about our concerns that Emirates A380 jets – among others - fly very low over our area.

Working for the whole community NATS wrote back asking us for flight data so they can investigate. They also helpfully clarified that A380s are larger planes, so can appear to be closer than they actually are. So, if you see a plane flying suspiciously low, we'd like you to send us the flight track. You can get this by visiting <u>https://www.flightradar24.com/</u> or via the Flightradar24 app. Find the relevant plane on the live map and tap it so you can see the track:



Then click the 'Share' icon and a menu like this will appear:

Now press 'Copy Link'. You can then send us the track to inspect, group together, and forward to NATS for investigation. Please send the track links to:

A Letter from St Mary's The hope of easter



In a couple of days' time it will Easter, the most important festival in the Christian calendar. A time for celebrating the day that Jesus Christ rose from the dead – the resurrection, the most momentous event in human history and one that has changed and is changing millions of lives.

If this were a blockbuster film, you might expect the resurrection to be accompanied by claps of thunder and flashing lights. Surprising, then, that in John's gospel it is described through the eyes of a lone woman called Mary Magdalene, reportedly a lady of dubious character and not at all the sort of person you would write about in a respectable village magazine.

Mary had been at the foot of the cross as Jesus died and knew for certain that he had breathed his last. Now, before daybreak, she is headed to his tomb to pay her last respects to the only person who had treated her with dignity. To her horror she finds that the stone that covered the entrance has been rolled away and that Jesus' body is missing. Distressed and confused she rushes off to find Peter and John with the news of the missing corpse and brings them to the grave. Unable to process the scene before them they simply return to their hiding place in Jerusalem leaving Mary alone with her grief.

Still weeping, Mary looks into the tomb and through her tears sees two angels, one at the foot and one at the head of where Jesus' body should have been. The angels ask a strange question, "why are you crying? From our perspective the answer seems obvious. After all she has witnessed the mock trials, torture and murder of the man she loved, the only person to show her any respect is dead and even in death he is abused; his body has been stolen. Isn't it natural that Mary should sink into a pool of tears? But from the point of view of these heavenly beings, these angels, there is nothing to cry about. If there is any point in human history when tears of sadness should be replaced with tears of joy it is in the empty tomb on the first Easter morning.

Of course this story is not just about Mary. This encounter between a fallen woman and two angels encapsulates the grief of messed up and abused people throughout history. Mary weeps for all of us. Mary weeps for the way this fallen world has treated her and the man she loved. In answer to the angels she simply says, "*They have taken my master*." If we read today's newspaper headlines or examine our own experience, the answer could be. They have taken my freedom by invading my country, taken my home by bombing my city, taken my son's life in a drone attack or any situation where we feel a sense of injustice or loss. In her answer, the world's grief is compressed into Mary's grief.

It's at this point of utter desolation that Mary senses another presence. Maybe tears blur her vision but even when Jesus asks her a mischievous question, Mary doesn't recognise him and mistakes him for a gardener. Jesus asks, "Who are you looking for?" One thing we do know about Mary is that she was no quitter. She was grief stricken and alone. She had been abandoned by the men and quizzed by angels and now even by Jesus but she was single minded in her mission to find him. Mary answers, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have put him, and I will get him."

Then, the wonderful moment of recognition. Just one word transforms her world and that word is her name, "Mary" spoken by Jesus.

Mary was the first to see the risen Lord Jesus but she wasn't the last. That same evening Jesus would appear to his disciples. In the next 40 days leading up to his ascension into heaven hundreds of people were met Jesus and they, like Mary, were able to declare, *"I have seen the risen Lord."* But the truly amazing thing is that through his spirit, Jesus still seeks to welcome by name anyone who perseveres in their search for him.

The Easter message is of hope and new beginning; of stepping out of darkness into a fresh way of looking at life. It tells us that our God is a personal God who calls us by name and that nothing, not even death can separate us from his love and from the promise of eternal life in his heavenly home.
